Why does the United Kingdom celebrate it?

- Black History Month originates from the United States. It was set up by black educators as a way of recognising and celebrating the contributions of Black people. The idea was soon adopted in the UK and first celebrated in London in 1987 as part of an African Jubilee year.
- People from **African** and **Caribbean** backgrounds have been a fundamental part of British history for centuries. However, their value and contribution to society is often overlooked, ignored or distorted. Much of the history we learn about often only amplifies the events and the achievements of white people. So, we celebrate everyone the opportunity to share, celebrate and understand the impact of black heritage and culture.

Because Black History Month originated in the United States, we often learn more about African American history. So, this year, our focus will be closer to home!

Did you know...?

The first Britons were dark skinned! Analysis of Cheddar Man, Britain's oldest (10,000 years old) complete skeleton tells us that they had dark to black skin, curly hair and blue eyes!

Slavery was not the start of the Black community's experience in England! In fact, Black people were here in England in the 18th century. They lived and worked at different levels of society - some found paid work as porters and trumpeters, while others were present at the royal courts of Henry VII, Henry VIII, Elizabeth I and James I.
